## From Pre-School to High School, Summer Program Keeps Reading Relevant



If your children love animals and enjoy stories about animals, then they are going to love this year's Summer Reading Program, "Tails and Tales." Events this summer will be both in-person and virtual. For in-person programs, we'll meet outdoors as much as possible with all COVID-19 safety protocols at the time of the program in place. Some events will have limited attendance, so you will need to call ahead to reserve your place. Flexibility will be key, so check our website and Facebook page or call for the most recent information.

#### Virtual Events

Checkers Library TV is a weekly educational and entertainment program starring Checkers the Inventor, his sidekick Snoozer and a variety of special guests. Each 30 minute episode will feature a different habitat and animal and will include many activities incuding visits to zoos and aquariums, games, crafts and more. A new show posts every Monday beginning June 7.

Each month two **virtual story times** for our youngest readers will feature a different animal. Crafts will be included in the Take & Make Bags available monthly for pick up at the library. Pick one up, take it home, and have fun!

#### At the Library

We'll have two **story times** each month at the library. When the weather permits, we will meet behind the library under the tulip magnolia tree.

Unicorns: Break the Cage Not everything at the city zoo is as it seems. Two curious kids take a closer look and discover what they believe is a unicorn. But unicorns aren't real...or are they? This show designed for K-5 includes an animated story, bite-sized science lessons, and an interactive video host. The show features live science experiments and everyone gets to participate. Animal Meet and Greet Come and meet some animal friends in person. We will meet on the soccer field at the YMCA several times with different animals. We thank our partners at the

YMCA for a great space for this event, with lots of room to spread out and plenty of parking.

**Read to the Dogs** One of our most popular programs, children get to read a book to a dog trained for this task. This is a big boost for reluctant readers.

#### Reading Goal Challenge

There will be reading goal challenges for all ages. Elementary students will receive a reading log and program guide with their report cards at the end of the school year, thanks to the great partnership we have with Northumberland Elementary School. The school reading goal set for the summer by NES is always a challenging one, but students have met every reading goal given to them, and I'm confident they will do it again! So, encourage students you know to keep reading all summer.

**Brag tags** are new reading rewards this summer for elementary students. Tags are earned for each ten books read and reported to the library. Students can earn up to ten tags and add beads for program attendance.

#### A Program For All Ages

Younger children, from infants to preschoolers, can track reading and earn prizes as well. Teens and adults can play BOOK BINGO. Pick up a BINGO card at the library or download one from **nplibraryva.org** When you get a BINGO, turn your card in and get a prize. Your name will be entered into a drawing for numerous prizes including Echo Dots, gift baskets and more.

Througout the summer, **Take & Make Bags** will be available outside of storytime to all preschool and elementary-aged kids. Bags contain a variety of crafts, activity sheets, games, and more. We are looking forward to an enjoyable summer full of "Tails and Tales!"

### Friends of the Library brings "Lockdown Lottery" to NPL

Por Friends of the Library fundraising during the pandemic has been a significant challenge – no High Teas, no Fashion Shows, and no Books Alive! or Arts Alive! events. But we think we have found a brilliant and socially distanced solution: The Lockdown Lottery!

Following in the footsteps of our Lancaster County Libraryneighbors, we are initiating a limited ticket lottery with 300 chances for seven winning tickets – six \$500 winners and one Grand Prize of \$5,000.

Tickets are \$100 each, and fractional purchases are allowed so people can share a the cost of a ticket and the potential prize. The drawing will be held on Saturday, July 17th at the Heathsville Farmers Market.

If all goes according to plan, the Lockdown Lottery should raise \$21,000 for the Library.

We are excited about this charitable event – it is COVID safe, it is transparent, and there is a sizable reward for the

seven winning ticket holders.

Tickets are for sale at the library, Ye Olde Book Shoppe and at a table every Saturday at the Heathsville Farmer's Market beginning April 17.


We consulted with the Virginia State Commission for Charitable Gaming and are carefully following their guidelines. Tickets will be available at the Library, the Bookstore, and directly from Library and Friends board members. You can buy tickets with a credit card only at the library.

For appearance's sake, library employees, current members of both library boards and their immediate families are ineligible to participate. But that leaves lots of nieces and nephews eligible to take part. Watch for the formal kickoff of the Lockdown Lottery on our Library's website.

# A new book and an 18-month long leadership program NPL's Arthur Newman is building his expertise as author and in library outreach



Before Arthur S. Newman was the library's community outreach supervisor, he was a full time communications technician working 70 hours-a-week, with a

roundtrip commute of just over four hours. That did not stop him from learning about the insurance industry and receiving a license to sell insurance. It was during that time he developed the idea for his debut novel "The Umbrella Clause." "Umbrella insurance will absorb the additional cost when all of your basic insurance needs or coverages are exhausted or excluded. It provides protection when all else fails.explained Newman. Like Newman's children's books, this

one is self-published.

#### Leadership Program

Newman will participate in the Association for Rural and Small Libraries Outstanding in Their Field Leadership Institute.
