New Mobile Library Coming Soon

As many of you know we have been on the hunt for a new Mobile Library. Our old "Big Blue" has had many repairs in the past two years and just can't be fixed any more. Our mechanic shared with us that the parts are not being made and has had to scour junk yards for what we need. So, we knew it was time. In early 2022 the Board of Trustees voted to purchase a new vehicle through TechOps in Stevensville, Maryland. TechOps special-

izes in emergency and police vehicles but in recent years has branched out to include Mobile Libraries. Recently they built the new Mobile Library for LaPlata County in Maryland and have also been awarded the contract for a new Mobile Library in Middlesex county here in Virginia. The committee comprised of Bill Armstrong, Jim Landrum, Arthur Newman and Jane Blue have travelled to a number of local library systems to see what they have in place and took a trip to TechOps to see their operation before making the recommendation to the Board. Over the past 8 months we have done extensive fundraising

to have the money necessary to make the purchase and we are so close to our goal. We need about \$46,000 of the \$216,000 needed and are hoping to receive some grants to fill in that gap. Next week we will purchase the van and then the work will start. We are so excited about this next step and hope to have our new Mobile Library out on the road sometime in the spring of 2024. Your help is still needed, donations are still being accepted please earmark them for the new Mobile Library.

Happy 9th Birthday Ye Olde Book Shoppe (YOBS)



A Very Brief History of Ye Olde Book Shoppe

YOBS was officially established nine years ago this month, in March of 2014. There was always a tradition of NPL patrons donating books to the library for resale. And the library itself regularly deaccessions underused portions of its collection. For many years, these donations and deaccessions were kept in a shed behind the library and brought into the meeting room twice a year for a multi-week sale. In 2013 NPL director Alice Cooper petitioned the Board of Trustees for relief from the twice-yearly burden of packing and unpacking these books. Alice and the Trustees' vice-president, Eve Jordan, had their eyes on an empty commercial retail site two blocks down the street. The Board of Trustees was skeptical that book sales in sleepy Heathsville could ever cover the rent and utility expenses such an enterprise would create.

The Friends of the Northumberland Public Library led the early buildout and interior redecoration, especially Bill Estell and the Walkers - Jay and Earline. A "book brigade," similar to a bucket brigade, moved the shed inventory from the library into the newly renovated retail storefront. Carol Kenefick was the original store manager and

"booked" the first official sales in April of 2014. To many people's amazement, there was strong interest in the shop from the beginning. Carol did yeoman's service establishing the routines and procedures of a commercial operation. The continuing puzzle was how to best monetize the donations and manage an ever-expanding inventory.



Another critical inflection point came in 2017 when Bob Taylor signed on as a store manager. Bob had extensive

bookstore experience with B. Dalton in NYC and organized the shop around traditional book categories and added a retail bookshop's physical layout. Sales blossomed further, but inventory management remained a challenge. Paradoxically the more popular the store became, the more inventory it generated.

It wasn't until Jane Blue became library director in 2019 and established a working relationship with Thrift Books in Baltimore that the shop became a "going concern," pro-

ducing regular and significant revenue for the library. Thus, the story of YOBS has been largely evolutionary, with many people contributing their expertise over the years – as it will doubtlessly continue to be. In the past year the book shoppe has also seen challenges, first in January of 2022 when an elderly lady drove her car through the wall. We re -opened in March with new furniture and new book shelves in the seating area. Then in September of 2022 a local gentleman drove through the back wall taking out the bathroom, though we were able to reopen we waited for a new bathroom until the end of October. COMING IN APRIL

Leaving a Legacy in Written Words Featuring Authors Gail Wilson Kenna, Ilona Duncan and Susan Moore

Northumberland Public Library Books Alive!

"All three of us are ardent believers in leaving a legacy in written words. Each of us was changed because of relatives who wrote letters and because family members saved them," says Gail Kenna. The featured authors to the first Books Alive event for 2023 will discuss their books, which take a reader through historical periods: 1849-50, 1903-04, and post-World War 2 Germany. The three writers will reveal how inheriting the letters changed their lives in

meaningful ways. Light appetizers and wine will be served.





Gail Wilson Kenna, a college professor, has taught in Germany, Malaysia, Venezuela, Colombia, and throughout the USA. The wife of a retired Air Force officer, a mother and grandmother, the author of four books, a recipient of many writing awards, Gail serves as the Creative Nonfiction judge for the annual Soul-Making Keats Literary Competition in San Francisco. Currently, Gail and her husband live on a creek of the Chesapeake Bay in Virginia's Northern Neck, where she continues to teach and write.



Susan Ferries Moore grew up in New England, graduated from Colby College in Waterville, Maine, spent her career in the environmental

field, and retired as a corporate executive. A mother and grandmother, she currently lives in Virginia's Northern Neck, where she and husband Jack enjoy a view of the Chesapeake Bay. For decades Susan carted around a box of her Gram's letters from her family's summer home, known as "Tip Top," on Greenwood Lake in New Jersey. When she finally opened the box, began to read the carefully organized letters in their original, postmarked envelopes, Susan discovered a story that she knew she had to tell.



A native of Germany, Ilona graduated with her Abitur in Latin and science, was a German/French translator and Pan American World Airways stewardess. She speaks six languages, teaches piano and organ, and is the author of *My Jewish Great Grandmother* and *At Home on the Road*. At present, Ilona lives on the Great Wicomico River in Virginia's Northern Neck.




Catching up with the Friends
