#### News from Ye Olde Book Shoppe by Arthur Newman Community Outreach Supervisor



On March the 22nd 2023 between the hours of 6am and 7am YOBS suffered another damaging blow that crippled our ability to serve the community with the trifecta that Northumberland Public Library is accustomed to, that being the Main Branch, the Mobile Branch and our readers paradise the Ye Olde Book Shoppe.

It was reported that a driver fell asleep and only managed to recover from her temporary lapse of unconsciousness after crashing into the book shop. However, unlike the two previous times in the last year and three months when the building was struck, it would take longer for us to recover from this reoccurring tragic drama. This time would be different because the structural damage included part of the wall that supports a beam that is an integral part of the building's stability.

The number one question over the four months while we were out of service was; When will the bookstore reopen? And a close second question was; What happened to the bookstore?

We are overjoyed to be back in business after the arduous journey. The wait has been touch and go for the building owner and for the library. Initially there was a discussion as to the safety of those who needed to make estimates as to the actual damage. This culminated into a support being erected to brace the beam that supports the apartments above. Then it was discovered that the support was not adequate and needed reinforcing. That debacle was resolved. Next came the back and forth with the insurance company and the multiple estimates that were needed in order to satisfy the insurance companies regulations.

By the end of June the work was underway to repair and restore Ye Olde Book Shoppe's residence. July gave us hope that soon we would be able to reoccupy and put the readers' paradise back together. We are pleased with the new look inside and thank our volunteers and the community for all the support we have received towards helping Ye Olde Book Shoppe reopen. If you haven't been able to stop by we encourage you to do so because there is nothing like a small town book store especially Ye Olde Book Shoppe, the Readers Paradise.



Another fun and eventful Summer Reading has come to a close. While we are wrapping up Summer Reading, our programming here at the library carries on into the fall.

One of our programs we offer for our youngest of readers is **1000 Books Before**Kindergarten for children from birth to 5 years old. As a mom of 3 chil-



dren, who just cannot get enough stories read, this is a wonderful program. I had one child complete it, one on the tail end, and I just started this reading journey with my 10 month old. Looking at the titles in their reading logs brings great smiles and fond memories that will last us a lifetime. Parents and grandparents, if you are interested, I encourage you to sign your little one up. You can sign up at the front desk and you will be given a notebook with logging pages. Or you can sign up through Beanstack and log books through the app. For every 100 books read, your budding reader can earn a prize here at the library. Even if your child has a favorite book they want you to read 10 times plus in a row, (believe me, I think I have *In a People House* by Dr. Seuss memorized). write them down 10 times plus in a row. They add up so quickly. When your child reaches 1000 books, they will be given a certificate along with their prize. We like to add their picture to our news monitor and newsletter to celebrate their accomplishment.



If you haven't downloaded our library Beanstack app and would like to give it a try, scan the QR code to the left or download the Beanstack Tracker app from the App Store or Google Play. Be sure to search for Northumberland Public Library once you have downloaded the app. Beanstack is a book tracking app that also has fun reading challenges you can tackle to win prizes. We used it once again this year for our Summer Reading program and I'm looking forward to rolling out some fun challenges for this fall.

So, fall into a good read with us this cozy season, see you

# Novelist & Goodreads! Great tools are just a click away for your next read! By Alison Towles Cataloger and Librarian



While we love recommending books and guiding patrons to titles or authors they might enjoy, there are some tools to help you do that on your own. One resource you can access from our website is <u>Novelist</u>. On our website in the banner there is a pull down menu for resources, you can access Novelist there. You can use the site to search for genres,

authors, or titles to get recommendations. If there is a book or author you like and you would like suggestions for similar titles or authors, search for the title or author you like. Then under the entry, you can click on title, author or series read-alikes for suggestions. We may not have all the books, but it can open some possibilities!

I'd also like to recommend a reader's social network site that I have found useful. <u>Goodreads</u> is a free social cataloging site for reading and book recommendations. It allows searching its



database of books, annotations, and reviews. Users sign up and "mark" books they are reading, have read, or want to read. Like Facebook, you find friends who are also users of the site. With these friends, you share your reading, your reviews, and your comments. Goodreads will also alert you to upcoming books by authors you've read and make recommendations based on your reading. There are thousands of lists generated by users and by Goodreads staff to help guide you. And your book list can help you keep track of what you've already read, something we can't really do for you at the library. (We can tell if you've checked it out before, but not whether you read it!) There is an annual opportunity to vote for your favorites in any number of genres, the Goodreads Choice Awards, that can point you to other books you'd like to read. I get a big kick out of one feature, an annual email with your year in books! It's amazing to see how many pages you read in one year, what was the longest, the shortest, got the best reader reviews, and all kinds of fun information. It doesn't matter how you read, either. Print, audio, and e-book editions all count.



Another way to keep track of your reading is through our website. Go to our website catalog and sign into your account, using your library card number as your username and password. In your account, there is a tab for history which will display all the books or other items you've checked out for a year. Again, I am always amazed at all the wonderful books and movies I've been able to enjoy from our library and I think you will be too!



Recently Northumberland Public Library was gifted the Middle Grade book "That Smudge of Smoke" by Edith Hemingway. Edie stopped by to share her book with us. Set in the Chesapeake Bay area in 1929, That Smudge of Smoke, is a compelling work of historical fiction.

After her mother dies suddenly, twelve-and-a-half year old Penelope Grace Sinclair (Piper) must go live aboard a steamboat captained by her father. Before she saw her father only twice a month when he was offduty. Now, she must see him every day.

As Piper learns how to adjust to her father and grieve for her mother, she also learns about life and work on a steamboat just before the Great Depression.



To keep her company, Piper keeps a diary which she names Dorie. Magically, Dorie comes alive and tells her side of the story too. Until a mysterious accident happens that separates Dorie and Piper, and all seems lost!

Then, in 2015, a boy named Garrett, who is struggling to cope with his father's traumatic injury, finds Dorie. Garrett reads Piper's story, bringing the past to life again. Because of words and music, families discover that the power of friendship can carry them through hard times.

## TIME TRAVEL by Andrea Trescott

Genealogy, or family history research, may be habit-forming. Each time you go back in time with your ancestors you may find yourself wishing for more hours or days to spend on this hobby. If you read mystery novels and love working challenging crossword puzzles you are apt to enjoy the journey through your family history.

I began researching my family lines approximately 35 years ago. While I'm not pursuing a specific goal my personal data base currently includes about 7500 persons, plus attachments of related census records, wills, orphans court records, military and land records, newspaper articles and obituaries, cemetery records, and photographs. Thus far I have lines with immigrant ancestors coming into New York, Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina and Barbados, mostly from Great Britain, but also from Germany. Early settlers were in Isle of Wight and Jamestown in the mid-seventeenth century. I discovered that two of my paternal lines, originating in Germany, came into this country in the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries.....something I never anticipated. When I hit a "brick wall" about 1800 on my maternal lines, I switched to research on my paternal lines and was so successful I fell into a rabbit hole from which I've yet to emerge.

Along with one of my sisters, I began research by asking questions of our mother and her sisters. Then we visited county clerks offices to view original records, and we also visited cemeteries to photograph markers of ancestors and other relatives. On one vacation visiting Kansas cousins, who understood our genealogy addiction, they took us to visit several cemeteries, as well as a tribal museum in Oklahoma. During early, pre-internet years of research a lot more leg work was involved in order to access the records of interest to us. There are still state and county offices we want to visit in order to explore records, which are not available through online sources.

The early conversations with our mother, aunts and distant relatives (often recorded and transcribed) gave both of us a great start and some wonderful stories to preserve. Of course we realized, like so many other genealogists, that we should have started our quest at a younger age, before family members died who may have been able to provide connection details and oral histories. Oral history interviews are great ways to "put meat on the bones" of your ancestors.

Once you've begun accumulating information and records on ancestors you will need to think about how you store the data for easy access. Many people are happy to maintain handwritten records. I've used the Family Tree Maker software, which is both easy to search and to add new records.

New researchers have a plethora of sources for research, in print and on-line. (I have one book case filled with such resources and records.) There are hundreds of free sites available for internet research.

Inside the Northumberland Public Library we are fortunate to offer free access to Ancestry.com, Fold3 (military records), and Family Search Affiliate on several of our computers. Should you need individual help accessing records on those sites you may schedule a 30 minute appointment with me. See elsewhere in this newsletter for more information. You can be assured that I am almost as excited to help you make discoveries as I am when making them for my lines. I hope I've piqued your interest in getting started with this great pastime.

- 1. Set up can be conducted beginning at 7 AM on September 23<sup>rd</sup>.
- 2. Each applicant will have a space reserved for them, check in at the meeting room of the Library to get your space number and if you have reserved a table to pick up a table.
- 3. Spaces are 10x12, no more than 2 spaces per applicant.
- 4. All vehicles must be moved to the Methodist church parking lot by 8 AM
- 5. Applicants may not start packing up until 1 PM and the end of the sale, no vehicles may be moved to the yard sale area until 1 PM.
- 6. Payment is non-refundable, yard sale is rain or shine
- 7. Cancellations do happen, reservation fees are non-refundable but can be transferred to someone else. It is your responsibility to let the FOL yard sale coordinator know in advance, the new persons name or that no one will be taking your space.
- 8. Be sure to bring help if you need your equipment, canopy or other items set up, there will not be someone available to help with your items.
- 9. Free Wi-Fi is available if you need to connect for credit card payments, the login is Nor-Lib and the password if Free1234.
- 10.If for some reason the Yard sale is cancelled we will make every effort to post the news well in advance on the Library website, Facebook page and Instagram as well as the Library electronic board. You may also contact us at the email or number listed above.
- 11. All vendors must comply with the State of Virginia Agriculture and County health codes.
- 12. MUST provide a current inspection report from the Virginia Department of Agriculture or Virginia Health Department, if applicable.
  - 13. Be responsible for the safety & purity of all products offered for sale.
- 14. Please provide your own food and drink, there will be no concessions unless food vendors are present
- 15. Take all trash and sale items that have not sold with you, all areas should be policed to make sure you have not forgotten anything, items left will become the property of the Friends of Northumberland Public Library and will be donated to a local charity regardless of the value.
  - 16. Return tables to the meeting room at the end of the sale.
