Divided into sections, Boundless also allows the parent/guardian to be the host of the account and see what their children are checking out. Parents/Guardians can set up parameters for their children too! It also provides educational resources for at home learning!


### YOU CAN JUDGE THESE BOOKS BY THEIR COVERS!

The common wisdom is that you shouldn't judge a book by its cover, whether literally or figuratively. That being said, some covers catch the eye and draw in the reader with an invitation to explore and experience their contents. Some of the best covers of 2023 were also some of the best reads.

Weyward, by Emilia Hart, has an intricately illustrated cover that matches its story. The winner of two Goodreads Choice Awards (Best Debut Novel and Best Historical Fiction), it is a spellbinding tale of three generations of women with a legacy of witchcraft and an unusual connection to the natural world. Weaving together the stories of these three extraordinary women across five centuries, it is an astonishing debut and an enthralling novel of female resilience.

Let Us Descend, by Jesmyn Ward, has a cover with beautiful artwork that alludes to the main character's affinity for bees. Ward, a two-time National Book Award winner. is a lyrical writer and her prose is compelling. Let Us Descend tells the heartwrenching but ultimately freeing story of Annis, a young slave sold south by her sire and owner. In her travels, she finds comfort in memories and in connections with spirits.



Neil deGrasse Tyson's **To Infinity and Beyond: A Journey of Cosmic Discovery** draws on mythology, history and literature to take the reader on an entertaining journey to the farthest reaches of the cosmos. Along the way, science greets pop culture as Tyson explains the triumphs - and bloopers- in Hollywood's blockbusters.

The Ghost Ship, by Kate Mosse, is the third installment in a series but can easily be read alone. In the early 1600's, the mysterious vessel of the title has hunted pirates to liberate those enslaved by corsairs along the Barbary Coast. It is a thrilling novel of adventure and buccaneering, love and revenge, stolen fortunes and hidden secrets on the high sea.

### What does the Information Age have in store for us in 2024?

More practical uses for Artificial Intelligence, we can expect Generative AI to skyrocket. Cloud storage and its applications will continue to dominate the information landscape. Smartphones will continue to add features the majority of users will never use. Virtual reality headsets and displays will dominate digital learning.

What will not change in 2024?

I.T. or information technology. I.T. is the use of software and hardware to manage communications which include data, audio and video. Specifically your personal data that is being collected and disseminated to third parties.

For example if you still think a menu only refers to the pamphlet that is handed to you to order food. If you think swiping right, left, up and down is what you do with your credit card. If you think tap, double tap, right and then left is a dance move with special shoes. Then you're probably navigating the world of technology with great difficulty.



Since YOBS reopened the last week of July, retail sales have been spectacular. The four months we were closed have generated significant pent-up demand for Heathsville's favorite bookstore. August was particularly noteworthy, with the bookshop's retail sales exceeding \$2,000 for the month and averaging over \$500 per sales week. And, thanks to Friends of the Library operating cash donation and the latest insurance settlement, total revenue for the first six months of the fiscal year exceeded \$15,000, the highest total for that period in the ten-year history of YOBS. Donations of books, too, have been robust. Inventory has never looked fresher and first-class books are shelved weekly. Mary Frazier and Dana Nicholas should receive a special salute and thank you for their seasonal decorations and displays. The Philosophical Society, which meets on Friday afternoons regularly, comments on the ever-changing cheerful and timely ornamenting schemes present in the shop. Bravo and thank you one and all who make YOBS such an ongoing success!


