
Pocket Park Ground Breaking

On a muggy July morning, local community leaders, members of the library boards and library staff met to break ground for the Pocket Park. The park, taking up less than an acre, thus the name Pocket Park or Parkette, will be directly behind the library. The walking path, about a quarter of a mile long has already been poured as has the pad for the Gazebo. Next we will have fencing installed around the utilities, the arbor and the gazebo installed. Plants will undoubtedly have to wait until spring, although an irrigation system as well as preparation for those plantings will take place as the months progress.



ATTENTION FAMILY HISTORY RESEARCHERS

We have exciting news for family and regional history research enthusiasts. Our library now offers access to Newspapers.com

While I have accessed numerous newspapers on the Chronicling America website, Newspapers.com provided me with speedier results. My personal family history database (after almost 40 years of research) includes 8000+ persons, along with more than 22,000 support documents and photographs. Like most genealogists, I have "brick walls" on some family lines. Recently, I purchased a 6 month subscription to Newspapers.com, for home use. (At one time Ancestry.com subscriptions included access to such articles.) During the first 3 or 4 weeks of use I shared 400+ newspaper clippings with my sister. I "found" two of our extended family members who had been "lost" to us, for whom we'd fruitlessly searched for hours. One of the two was a young man, Winfield Scott, who was killed in less than 1 year, after enlisting to fight with the Union during the U.S. Civil War. That "find" came from an article and photograph of Winfield's brothers who had come together for the first time in 30 years. Other family historians will appreciate our excitement about these finds.

So, our library has even more to offer those genealogists who aren't able to travel far to search for relevant documents and records. Our patrons may also use Ancestry Library Edition, for access to genealogical and historical sources on-line. That source includes billions of indexed names and thousands of databases, which cover the United States, Canada, United Kingdom, Europe, Australia, and other areas.

Fold3, another resource available at NPL, provides patrons with access to 640 million military records. You have convenient access to U.S. military records, including stories, photos and personal documents of the men and women who served their country. Included are the American Revolutionary War through the U.S. in the Afghan War, along with some records of soldiers from other countries.

Your library is also a Family Search Affiliate. Affiliate libraries have access to Family Search's digital genealogical collections, which are otherwise only accessible through a Family Search Center. Local affiliates may be a public or higher education library, archive, museum, cultural center, or genealogical or historical society.

Whether you have done much family history research, or you're new to this "obsession" you can make a ½ hour appointment with me on the 1st or 3rd Thursday each month, or on Friday afternoons, between 1:30-4:30 P.M. Call or email me at 804-580-5051 or atrescott@nplibraryva.org to get started.

One last note. NPL is exploring the possibility of hosting a "scanning event" as one facet of the NNK 250th independence celebration. So, please let me know if you're interested in having historical/old documents, letters, ledgers, church or store records scanned to preserve them digitally. Such digital records may then be saved at the historical society or at the Library of Virginia in Richmond, where they will be available for viewing by researchers. A scanning event will need support and interest from the community in order for us to proceed in planning it.

Tech Tips

Let's talk about organization. Not just any organization but organizing those pesky electronics. Maybe your desktop or laptop's main screen is cluttered with folders, documents, pictures, music and other digital litter. Okay not litter, paraphernalia. Or, perhaps you have taken the plunge and all of your technical needs are completed on your smartphone or tablet. They too need to be decluttered. Let's start with the desktop, first we need to create a new folder.

Creating a New Folder



Step 1 Right click anywhere on your desktop, this will display the options menu.

Step 2 Choose (new folder), this will create a new folder.





Step 3 Name the folder appropriately (let's use pictures for example)

Step 4 Drag and drop pictures from your desktop into your new folder called pictures



You can do this with your documents also. (Pictures Inserted for each step)

If you would like to see how this process works with your phone or tablet please plan to visit our computer class on **Monday's from 3 to 5**. In our class we discuss and teach practical computing for our everyday electronics needs.

Note: If you are running out of storage on your phone or you get the notification your cloud drive is full, you can use the tips you learn in class to save all of your important data to your computer or an external storage device.



September 28th is National Good Neighbor Day

"I'm convinced of this: Good done anywhere is good done everywhere. For a change, start by speaking to people rather than walking by them like they're stones that don't matter. As long as you're breathing, it's never too late to do some good."

Have you noticed how our culture has redefined what a good neighbor looks like? It used to be a good neighbor was someone you could count on. Today, many people consider a good neighbor as someone who is quiet and leaves you alone. That has led to more isolation, fewer friendships, and a loneliness epidemic. In 2023, the United States Surgeon General declared loneliness a public health crisis. **We think it's time to change that.**

Unlike National Pretzel Day, National Miniature Golf Day, or even April Fools Day, National Good Neighbor Day is an actual holiday. It was created in the early 1970s by Becky Mattson of Lakeside, Montana. In 1978, United States President Jimmy Carter issued Proclamation 4601:

"As our Nation struggles to build friendship among the peoples of this world, we are mindful that the noblest human concern is concern for others. Understanding, love and respect build cohesive families and communities. The same bonds cement our Nation and the nations of the world. For most of us, this sense of community is nurtured and expressed in our neighborhoods where we give each other an opportunity to share and feel part of a larger family...I call upon the people of the United States and interested groups and organizations to observe such day with appropriate ceremonies and activities."

Let's reverse the epidemic of loneliness in our country. It starts with a simple act of neighboring on September 28.

It only takes a small act of neighborliness to make a big difference in the life of a neighbor. Acts of kindness among neighbors have become rare enough these days that being neighborly stands out as a special event for most people, and it can open the door to further connections and neighborhood involvement. But where should you start? Reaching your neighbors does not mean you host a block party with inflatables first thing. It is better to start small by reaching out to your eight closest neighbors with an act of kindness. As you get to know your neighbors and they get to know you, the next step could be a food event. Just make sure your focus is always on building connections, not just entertaining.

Ye Olde Book Shoppe News

As predicted in a previous newsletter, **Ye Olde Book Shoppe** enjoyed a record-breaking fiscal year ending June 30th. Not only did YOBS generate gross revenue of over \$24,000 for the year, but net income (revenue after expenses) was also an annual record at over \$14,000. This number represents the actual external cash injected into the Library's operating budget from the year's activities at the bookstore. Monthly retail sales from our storefront are averaging \$1,175 for the year. Thrift Books and eBay Sales were also strong. Additionally, there was a substantial contribution from an insurance settlement and a generous donation from the Friends of the Library. These numbers are incredibly satisfying for the **All-Volunteer** workforce since they quantify the volunteers' time and efforts needed to run our Library successfully. As one of the "old-timers" who has participated in this decade-long exercise, I find it an excellent example of sustained community service for the greater good. We should all be proud of what we have accomplished. YOBS has indeed woven itself into the fabric of Heathsville and Northumberland County. Thank you, one and all!

> **Harvest of Secrets**, by Ellen Crosby, is the ninth book in the Wine Country mystery series featuring Lucie Montgomery and her 500 acre Virginia vineyard. It's harvest season, the busiest time of the year for wine makers. In this book, the search for the killer of an aristocratic French winemaker puts Lucie on a collision course with a murderer. Set in the historic heart of Virginia's horse and hunt country, this cozy mystery series is filled with fascinating details about the science and alchemy of wine making and endearing characters.


First Frost, by Sarah Addison Allen, is the second book featuring the Waverley family by this author of Garden Spells. "It's October in Bascom, North Carolina, and autumn will not go quietly. As temperatures drop and leaves begin to turn, the Waverley women are made restless by the whims of their mischievous Sarah Addison Allen apple tree... and all the magic that swirls around it. But this year, first frost has much more in store." That beginning of the description of this book is enough to make you want to read it and find out what happens! Enjoy Allen's enchanting world and fall for her charmed characters in this captivating story that proves that a happily-ever-after is never the real ending to a story. It's where the real story begins.

Practical Magic, by Alice Hoffman, is the first book published in what later became the Practical



Magic series. October - and Halloween - seem to evoke thoughts of witches and magic. In this bewitching novel from the New York Times bestselling author, the Owens sisters confront the challenges of life and love. For more than two hundred years, the Owens women have been blamed for everything that has gone wrong in their Massachusetts town. Gillian and Sally have endured that fate as well: as chil-PRACTICAL dren, the sisters were forever outsiders, taunted, talked about, pointed at. Their elderly aunts almost seemed to encourage the whispers of witchery, with their musty house and their exotic concoctions and their crowd of black cats. But all Gillian and Sally wanted was to escape. One will do so by marrying, the other by

running away. But the bonds they share will bring them back—almost as if by magic.

The Dutch House, by Ann Patchett, is a novel that also explores the family bonds that both save and twist the lives of those who share them. At the end of the Second World War, Cyril Conroy combines luck and a single canny investment to begin an enormous real estate empire, propelling his family from poverty to enormous wealth. His first order of business is to buy the Dutch House, a lavish estate in the suburbs outside of Philadelphia. Meant as a surprise for his wife, the house sets in motion the undoing of everyone he loves. The story is told by Cyril's son Danny, as he and his older sister, the brilliantly acerbic and self-assured Maeve. are exiled from the house where they grew up by their stepmother. The two wealthy siblings are thrown back into the poverty from which their parents had escaped and find that all they have to count on is one another. This compelling story takes place over the course of five decades. The audiobook, narrated by Tom Hanks as the voice of Danny, is especially rich. It makes for a great "listen".

Book Drops Throughout Northumberland County



Did you know there are various book drops throughout the county. You can drop your books in one of these book drops any time and we will pick them up.

On the North side of the county we have a book drop in Callao at Tootsies Diner. The book drop is pic-

tured above. Books are picked up from this location on Friday mornings.

In the middle of the county you can drop your books at Lilian retail store. The book drop is located in the back of the store close to the restrooms. This book drop is checked on Tuesday mornings.

On the west side of the county you can find a book drop at the Wicomico Church Post office, inside. Just take a right inside the doors and you will see the book drop on the floor to the right. This book drop is checked on Saturdays and sometimes Sunday.

As always we have a very convenient book drop right in front of the Library, it is checked twice a day, morning and night. You can drop your books in this book drop any time we are closed. But, when we are open try to bring them inside, so we can say hello.
