As of the writing of this newsletter, the plants are being delivered and much work will begin in the coming weeks. Over 175 plants will be delivered in the next 2 days. The water line has been installed for the irrigation system and work for that should begin around the 13th of May. Another exciting aspect of the park will be Wren's Story Walk. About 8 story panels will be installed along the walk with stories about Northumberland County, such as how Holly Graded and the Rosenwald schools got started. Did you know there was a meteor



Though the fun does not immediately start at the beginning of May that doesn't mean you can't get your practicing in now. Let those creative juices start flowing and prepare yourself for the official Summer Reading start date of May 21st! That gives you plenty of time to check-out some books on music, drawing, cooking, and other artistic hobbies you may practice or want to learn about. It

also gives you plenty of time to enter some of your masterpieces into the community art gallery in the library. Whether that be to display your work,

We, of course, will be delving into those hobbies here at the library with our art-themed Summer Reading Story Times and our alternating Thursday activities. Starting on Tuesday, May  $27^{\rm th}$ , we will begin

having art-themed Story Times for our children ages 0 to 5/6. We always welcome all ages to attend these Story Times, but our primary focus is on younger children. Each Tuesday, we will focus on a different aspect of art, making wonderful masterpieces after each Story Time.

The littles are not the only ones getting all the crafting fun. We will have programs for children 6/7 and up on alternating Thursdays starting at the beginning of June. These programs will allow the children to explore color, painting, fabric and fiber arts, and even cooking. We don't want to limit the possibilities of creativity by sticking with one particular artistic medium. We want everyone to be able to explore all artistic mediums.

June 12<sup>th</sup> from 1:30 PM – 3:30 PM we will be hosting a Color Fight event outside in the library's new park. We will learn how to make felted soaps and explore the wonders of fabric and fiber arts with a professional artist at the helm. What better way to learn about a new artistic medium than with a fun activity exploring it, guided by a master in the craft?

We don't just have one guest leading the charge. Moving away from June and into July, on July 10<sup>th</sup> from 1:30 PM – 3:30 PM, we will welcome Averelle Dylan from the Rappahannock Art League. She will be leading us in a painting class where we will transform beautiful photographs into masterpiece paintings. Hood. A blend of fairytales and artful acting will paint a lovely picture in your mind of the stories you know and love.






### **Pertinent Non-Fiction**

Keeping up with current events may be a challenge today but these selections might help you with some of the issues we see in our daily news feeds.


### A Concise History of the Middle East by Ibrahim Al-Marashi and Arthur Goldschmidt Jr.



The Middle East, for a region so frequently discussed in the USA, is criminally misunderstood by the average American. Much of that misunderstanding stems from a lack of basic historical knowledge about the region and its various peoples. For those interested in redressing this deficiency, A Concise History of the Middle East is a fine place to begin that journey. This work is very nearly a college textbook, but written by just two people. It covers a staggering volume of time and space, and, given its breadth, leaves relatively little untreated. Those already familiar with the basic timeline of the Middle East may feel that this work lacks depth, but they are not its target audience. This is a book for beginners in the historical discipline, and if that's you, I can easily recommend this book.


### On Freedom by Timothy Snyder

Freedom is a word that gets tossed around a lot in the USA, and it always has been. It is arguably the defining characteristic of American life and culture, or at least we seem to feel that way. Still, for all its importance, and for all our insistence that we've got it, very few people can provide a clear, satisfying definition of what freedom really is. On Freedom proposes to do just that. It paints a clear picture of freedom as both an ethical value in itself, and a source, or enabler, of all other ethical values. It describes freedom as not merely the absence of oppression, but as something actively generated and refined by society, affected by every decision it makes and action it takes. It also points out that, somewhere along the line, society may have forgotten this and acquired the sense that freedom is something inherent in nature, or granted to others by those with power. If you fancy a reassessment or redefinition of one of the most important generate in American sulture. On Freedom is



definition of one of the most important concepts in American culture, On Freedom is the book for you.

### Life: My Story Through History by Pope Francis




Pope Francis, born Jorge Mario Bergoglio, passed away on April 21, 2025 at the age of 88. The Papacy, and by extension the Catholic Church, has had an awkward relationship with the United States. As a largely protestant nation, many Americans were distrustful of, even openly hostile towards, the Catholic Pope. However, during his papacy, Pope Francis seems to have bridged the divide somewhat. Even outside of Catholic circles, both here and abroad, many people found Pope Francis to be a laudable source of moral authority. His influence on the modern Catholic thought, the full extent of which we cannot yet know, portends great significance. For this reason alone, Pope Francis' life and his beliefs are worth studying. And who better to tell the tale than the man himself? Life takes its reader from the future Pope's childhood in Ar-

gentina at the onset of World War II, to the height of his papacy at the close of the COVID-19 pandemic, and provides fascinating insight into the mind of one of the world's most influential figures.








### **NPL News Group**

The Westmoreland Players Theatre, located in Callao, is offering a \$10 discount to patrons of the Northumberland Public Library for tickets to the upcoming production of "Alabama Story," by Kenneth Jones, playing from May 16 through June 1. This offer is being made to library patrons in recognition of the play's themes about libraries and the freedom to read.

"Alabama Story" is a play based on a true-life incident that took place in Montgomery, Alabama, in 1959. It is the story of Emily Wheelock Reed, who was the head of the Alabama State Public Library Service. Miss Reed was attacked by a segregationist Alabama State Senator for promoting a children's book called "The Rabbits' Wedding," that the senator claimed carried hidden integrationist messages. It is also the story of childhood friends - an African American man and a woman of white privilege - who are reunited as adults in Montgomery by happenstance at the same time the book controversy is unfolding around them. It is a courtroom thriller, a memory play, a romance, and a historical drama. Above all it is about how character is tested in a time of great social change.

The Westmoreland Players Theatre serves the entire Northern Neck. The theatre has repeatedly been named as the Best Performing Arts Company in Eastern Virginia by Virginia Living Magazine.

Tickets may be purchased at <a href="https://www.westmorelandplayers.org/tickets">https://www.westmorelandplayers.org/tickets</a>. Tickets are normally \$25 for adults and \$17 for students. However, Northumberland County Public Library patrons may obtain a \$10 discount for each ticket purchased by entering the payment code "NPL" when prompted. This discount is available to the first 200 library patrons who purchase tickets for any performance other than the opening night gala on May 16. Patrons are urged to purchase tickets early to ensure you get the performance and seat assignment you prefer.

## Be Summer Ready with these Beach Reads! By Savannah Albrecht



Augustus Everett is an acclaimed author of literary fiction. January Andrews writes best-selling romance. Where she pens a happily ever after, he kills off his entire cast. They're polar opposites. 

#### Make sure to Buckle Up Your Tech!

Please buckle up your laptop and secure your other tech devices.

Summer is not just about rays of sun and pesky bugs, it is vacation time.

Although we may venture to places unknown, the temptation to stowaway our tech devices is certain. When we bring along our faithful traveling companions, which may or may not include humans, we do well to consider certain precautions.

We may plan on exercising our right to have a vacation free from work but not free from the cyber

threats that encroach upon our personal data, identity and money. One thing is for sure, the environment for safely transporting your technology has changed. Also, we should consider the usage of our devices and the internet while vacationing. The cyber threat is even more pronounced when we are away from our home and office.

Here are some safety tips you should adopt even before you leave your house.

- 1. Update and backup your devices and secure your data.
- 2. Only take what is necessary.
- 3. Secure your devices physically, for instance, waterproofing, body gloves, screen protectors.
- 4. Password-protect all devices and turn on two factor authentication.
- 5. Turn on location detection, or find my device software.
- 6. Consider GPS tracking devices.
- 7. Only tell trusted individuals your itinerary.
- 8. Do not post on social media.
- 9. Secure your home with cameras or an alarm system. Hire a house sitter. Or let the annoying and noisy neighbor know you will be on vacation.

Now you are ready to fly.

- 1. Don't forget about airplane mode.
- 2. When you arrive at your destination, confirm all networks are secure.
- 3. Do not use local Wi-Fi connections that are not password secure. Even if they are secure, use these connections with an alert mind.
- 4. Use software like task manager to monitor network traffic.
- 5. Use a trusted VPN service. (**Do Not** overpay for this service).
- 6. Don't leave your devices unattended.
- 7. Regularly check for foreign tracking devices.


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### The Friends of the Library

party and Silent Auction. The event hosted at Mt. Zion Mansion boasted a sell out




sponsor at the library, outside of the normal operating budget such as summer reading

Summer Reading is just around the corner and we are finishing up our prepara-

tions for another fun filled program. Registration cards will be available at the front desk to register for the Summer Reading Challenge starting May 21st. Parents, keep an eye out in your child's backpack. The registration card and Summer Reading Program will go home with your child after the Summer Reading Kick Off May 9th. You can fill out the card and bring it to the library to register or sign up with the digital option on the back of the card and keep up with your Reading Log digitally from your Android or Apple device or computer.


First you will need to scan the QR code with your phone or use the link: <a href="https://nplibraryva.beanstack.com/reader365">https://nplibraryva.beanstack.com/reader365</a>
Or download the Beanstack Tracker app on Google Play or the App Store.

Once you have downloaded the app and/or opened the link you will be taken to our Northumberland Public Library

homepage on Beanstack and you will have to create an account for yourself and however many readers on your account through the Library. Parents, you will also be able to indi-

More on those below.





Logging with Beanstack has never been easier. When you are ready to log your reading, press the Plus sign or Log Reading button. You will then be asked, who do you want to log? Choose the readers you need to log reading to. Choose the logging minutes option. Here you fill in the fields for the Day,

Title (optional), Author (optional), and Time Spent Reading. Once you have filled in the fields, press Log. When a section of the Reading Challenge and/or the Reading Challenge is completed, Beanstack will prompt you with a digital badge. The digital badges will have some instructions and an award attached. (For example, when you read the first 60 minutes, your first badge will be awarded with a prompt to tell you to come by the Library to pick up a Brag Tag)






